

My Child Traveled out of State

“Can My Child Go to School Today?”



We want your child/children to come to school to learn. We also want your child/children to be safe and healthy. In order to do this, we have to work together.

Noting that Connecticut, Pennsylvania and New Jersey have been granted travel exemptions, if your child has traveled to a designated

parent/guardians must work with students to complete PLAN A or PLAN B

PLAN A

- the school must be immediately notified; and
- the student (and siblings) must quarantine for a minimum of 14 days

OR

PLAN B

For a student that was in a hot-spot state for more than 24 hours, upon returning they:

- must quarantine;
- obtain a COVID-19 test within 3 days of re-entering the state;
- on day 4 of their quarantine, the traveler must obtain another COVID test. If both tests come back negative, the traveler may exit quarantine.
- dates of travel, name of state(s) visited and both tests showing negative results must be provided to the school's Health Office before returning.

For a student that was in a hot-spot state for **less than 24 hours**, upon returning they:

- do not need quarantine upon arrival in New York State;
- however, must fill out New York State's traveler form

- upon entry into New York State take a COVID diagnostic test 4 days after their arrival home

date of travel, name of state(s) visited and test showing a negative result must be provided to the school's Health Office before returning.
